MINISTER'S REPORT

In my personal Bible Study, I've been making my way through the Book of Judges, that dark and disturbing account of what happens to a nation in days when there was no king. Inevitably, the story spirals downwards deeper and deeper into sin, as the people throw off the restraints of God's Word and, pursuing their own whims and wishes, some of the later chapters are very difficult to read.

Two lessons seem obvious. Firstly, that there is nothing new under the sun. What takes place in the Book of Judges is mirrored in today's world as society around us throws off the restraint of God's Word and plunges into the most shameful pursuit of sin. And secondly, as for the people of Israel in the days of the Judges, so too today, people mistakenly believe there is no one to hold them to account for their actions. There may have been no 'physical' or 'human' king in Israel, but God was still on the throne and to Him all people must answer. The Book of Judges is a stark reminder that people do not 'naturally' drift towards godliness.

Justification and Sanctification are two 'separate' aspects of the Christ's life, but they must not be 'separated'. To claim to have saving faith, that is, to be justified, and yet not to be experiencing sanctification means that something is seriously amiss in your life. As Teaching Elder, it is my responsibility to ensure that members of First Portadown benefit from the Means of Grace, those gifts of God that encourage our growth in sanctification. My primary task is preaching the Word and leading in worship in order that those who attend our services are challenged by the gospel and changed by the Spirit of God. Along with emphasising the importance of engaging in public worship I want to encourage you in personal Bible Study and Prayer as it is these daily and weekly practices which will keep you from drifting into sin.

Reflecting back on 2023, for most of the year I carried the additional responsibility of looking after the vacant congregation of Waringstown. It was an honour to take part in the installation of Mark Haugh in September and pray that God will use him mightily in his ministry there for many years to come.

In May, we welcomed Joanna McFarland onto the Staff Team as Ministry Coordinator with a particular emphasis on the 18–35-year-olds in the congregation. Already we can see the impact Joanna's work is having and pray that God would continue to use, lead and encourage her as she settles into our congregation and community.

It was a delight to work with Lincoln Rus for six weeks over the summer. I would like to express thanks to all those who helped to make Lincoln's time among us so profitable. I pray that God would continue to guide him in his candidacy for the Presbyterian Church. It would be great to have him as part of PCI.

Thank you all for your support and encouragement. We live in days of great challenge for the Church, days when complacency is fatal to congregations. May we press on together pursuing Christlikeness and faithfulness in His service,

Session Report 2022 YEAR

On 1 January 2022 a new Clerk of Session was appointed. Robert Dowey succeeded John Finlay who had held the post for around 6 years. Thanks is due to John for his faithfulness, example and work during that time while holding down a full-time job as a teacher.

The Year commenced with a Week of Prayer and an Elders conference. A major focus throughout the year was the 200th Anniversary Celebrations of the establishment of the Church (anniversary date is 12 December 2022).

In February the "Hope Explored" course commenced and Rico Tice preached at the morning service. In April the Choir were advised as to changes to be made as to the frequency of the Church Choir leading Congregational Worship. These changes had a mixed reception and necessitated the Minister and Session spending a lot of time over a prolonged period discussing and deciding on the issues arising.

The Kennedy family were home from Cambodia for the months of June and July. In June Kirsty-Lee Finlay was appointed as a permanent part-time Female Pastoral Worker. The first Sunday of October was the last service conducted by the Assistant Minister Rev Trevor Kane. Trevor and his family left to take up Ministry in Glenwherry Presbyterian Church. Trevor, his wife Suzanne and 5 children played an active role in the congregation and were a great asset to congregational life and witness. Country Comes to Town was held for the first-time post covid on 8 October and the Church had a stand on the main street of the town.

The Session were notified that Edenderry Ministries Limited would cease trading on 31 December 2022.

Session Report 8 Months to 31 August 2023

The latter half of the 2022 Year had numerous celebrations of the 200th Anniversary. resulting in the 8 months of 2023 appearing to be passive in terms of activity. Non the less, the routine and often unseen work of seeking to advance Christs Kingdom continued albeit with a much lower profile.

The first meeting in January had a period of reflection on the life of Bill Burnett the

longest serving and active Elder (60 years' service) who had died on 16 December 2023.

A finalisation of the 21 names of the newly elected Church Committee was agreed by Session with the first meeting of this Committee to be held on 14 February 2023. At the Session meeting in February a report from a Commission of the Armagh Presbytery dated 20 February 2023 was presented. Session accepted the report and the recommendations in it. Regrettably, despite the report of Presbytery the "fall-out" arising from the changed role of the Choir continued to rumble on during the period of this report.

A new post, that of Ministry Coordinator had been created in 2022 and recruitment had taken place, resulting in the appointment of Miss Joanna McFarland with effect form 1 May 2023. A Summer Assistant, Lincoln Russ from the USA was with the congregation for the month of July and part of August. Scott McMenemy was licensed as a Minister at a service held on Sunday 11 June 2023. From September 2022 until early September 2023 our Minister Rev Robin Brown was Vacancy Convenor of Waringstown Presbyterian Church.

An evening meeting titled "Pastoral Care and Gender Identity" was held in the meeting house for all congregations in the Armagh Presbytery. This subject is very relevant to the secular society we live in. An evangelism outreach event for men was held in June. The Church registered as a "Welcoming Church" and this helped attract "Foreign Nationals" to find the Church and interface with Church members.

The Holiday Bible Club was held in the Church in June. During the summer B.B. camp was held; teams of young people went to Ballina, Malahide and Howth and Philadelphia to do outreach.

A decision was taken that Guides would cease operating at the end of May and they would be replaced with a similar organisation called "Eden Girls" where Biblical Truths could continue to be taught in addition to vocational activities.

A tea was held on Sunday 25 June remembering 50+ years of service in the Choir by Robert Chambers.

Please keep in your Prayers our Minister and Pastoral team. Christian work has always been challenging but in these times in which we live it is particularly challenging. Wisdom is required for the Session as it strives to lead the spiritual life of the congregation in challenging situations.

It must always be borne in mind that while programs are helpful and useful "Mans chief end is to glorify God and enjoy him for ever". We need to always focus on our Saviour Jesus Christ and worship him in Spirit and in Truth.

TREASURER'S REPORT - MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

On behalf of the Missionary Committee, I would like to thank all who contributed towards the support of our six missionary families during 2022. The families who are supported: Henry & Silvia Bell, Luke & Karis Carson, Robert & Kyla Cuthbert, John & Sarah Kennedy, Jonathan & Nicola McCracken, and Avisai & Judith Suarez very much appreciate your ongoing interest. Through the Missionary Fund we endeavour to meet our families' basic costs and, unless otherwise designated, your contributions go in full towards meeting this need.

Giving during 2022 decreased compared with 2021 (down £3345) but due to a very generous legacy from the Late William Calvert estate we were able to forward £73 029 to the above-mentioned families together with donations totaling £1165 to others as designated. This represents an increase in support of 7.37%.

In 2021 £69 343 was distributed. One area of notable decrease has been in recovery of Gift Aid - in 2022 £9 115 was received against £11545 in 2021. If you are a taxpayer and wish to have an extra 25% claimed from HMRC on your behalf, please ask for a Gift Aid form. Methods of giving have changed with many more donating by direct debit - due particularly to the impact of Covid-19 but either method is very welcome! Last year the average number of monthly envelopes was 54, while the average number of direct debits was 46.

Other income includes dividends from invested bequests. In 2022 we received £4628. Another much appreciated source is the mid-week meetings yielding £351. The Missionary Committee also administers the Discretionary Fund. This is regularly funded by annual ground rents, but we also received a very generous legacy from the estate of the Late Miss Barbara Hunter. From this fund we distributed £2 500 by way of Grants of Encouragement and grants to other Mission Agencies. Thank you to all who give to and pray for our Missionary Families.


The December meeting is always a "Christmas Special"

Stewardship and Finance

Generosity encouraged

The church teaches its members to look to the Bible for advice about giving. God promises that those who give generously and cheerfully are not only a blessing to others but are richly blessed themselves.

"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."

2 Corinthians 9: 7-8

The Code of our Presbyterian Church in Ireland refers to "contributions by the people, in a spirit of generous and responsible stewardship for the work of the church."

The work of our church is almost entirely supported by giving from our congregation. It is a great help if our members contribute regularly, using one of our envelope schemes.

What to give to?

Weekly **Freewill Offering** (F.W.O.) supports our general fund, which finances the day-to-day work of our church, including stipend, other staff costs, our heat, light and insurances and all our other running costs. This also funds the assessments that are levied by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland.

Our **Property Fund** is for the maintenance of our meeting house, our church halls and the manse. It is used primarily for major projects.

The **Missionary Fund** supports the missionary families connected with our church, working at home and abroad, and also passes on gifts received for the benefit of other missionary workers. Monthly envelopes are available and these allow contributors to nominate a beneficiary. If not stated, allocation is carried out by our Missionary Committee.

How to give

Weekly envelopes are available for Freewill Offering and Property Fund. Monthly envelopes are available for Missionary Fund. Alternatively, you may prefer to contribute by monthly standing order from your bank or building society. Simply ask the treasurer for a form.

A gift to the church in your will

The work of the church has been greatly assisted by many generous gifts in the wills of members. You can see the enduring value of such gifts in the Bequest pages, later in this report. A gift to the church in your will is exempt from Inheritance Tax.

The Old Age Fund and The Presbyterian Women's Fund

The General Assembly seeks to provide a ministry among older members.

The object of the **Old Age Fund** and the **Presbyterian Women's Fund** is to help aged or infirm members of our church. Financial support may be provided in the form of a quarterly grant, or a one-off grant in special circumstances.

Applicants who meet **some** of the following criteria may be eligible:

- living at home
- income less than £12.000 per annum
- in receipt of Income Support, Attendance Allowance or Pension Credit
- savings less than £16,000
- under the pastoral care of a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland
- not receiving significant financial assistance from other family members
- having medical needs that require extra expenditure.

Please speak to our Minister if you would like to make an application.

GIFT AID

Gift Aid is a Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs scheme that is of great benefit to our church.

How Gift Aid works

The church can claim back the basic rate tax already paid on money received from individuals who have paid UK income tax or capital gains tax. No minimum contribution is required, you can cancel at any time and tax can even be recovered retrospectively.

All that is required is that the donor must pay tax at least equal to the amount of tax being reclaimed and must give their offering through one of our envelope schemes

Example

Basic rate income tax is 20%. If you give £8 to the church, this is treated as a gift made net of basic rate tax. The gross amount is £10 and so the church is able to reclaim the £2 tax.
